PRESENT STATUS

The College follows student centric learning methods for effective curriculum delivery a detail unit wise plan for experiential and participative learning adapted for enhancing the learning experiences of the students.

The college is incorporate more different modes for continuous internal evaluation. Program Outcome, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes are described in the syllabus. The

attainment of the learning outcomes to be evaluated properly. All the departments conduct internal examination as per requirement of the affiliating University.

H. Placement and Training Programme

Around 110 students aptitude training were given by Titan Leap, around 27 students IT training were given by Protechsoft and around 75 students JAVA training were given by ACEPRO skills. Around 233 students were placed in various companies during the year.

I. Faculty Career Development

During the year 3 faculty members belongs to Department of Commerce, 2 faculty members belongs to Department of Computer Science and 3 faculty members Corporate Secretaryship has completed their Doctorate degree.

SWOC ANALYSIS

Strength of the Institute:

Weakness of the institute:

- Lack of sufficient permanent teaching and non-teaching staff continues to increase the workload and administrative responsibilities of the regular faculty..
- Very few research project.
- Research and consultancy services have to be looked into.

Recommendations

Based on the finding members of the audit committee recommend the following for enhancing the teaching-learning system of the College:

- i. The college may strengthen a language lab.
- ii. Research culture needs improvement and interdisciplinary research to be initiated.
- iii. Proper documentation is required for all activities based on NACC recommendations.

- iv. Best practices of individual departments need to be institutionalised for effective delivery of curriculum and the course file to be assessed by IOAC.
- v. More students should be involved in the extension activities
- vi. More collaborations need to be established for faculty exchange, students exchange and internship etc.

Action Taken Report

- 1. The language department will conduct remedial classes to improve the language skills of the students who came from Tamil medium both at the departmental and college levels in the next academic year.
- 2. The college will take initiatives to introduce interdisciplinary research in the research field.
- 3. The department will take the necessary steps to maintain proper documentation for all activities based on NACC recommendations.
- 4. The college will encourage each department to introduce innovative healthy practices, and the department will make all the students contribute to those activities on a regular basis.
- 5. The department will encourage more students to get involved in the extension activities in the next academic year.
- 6. The college will endeavour to increase the scope of collaborative activities for faculty exchange, student exchange internships, etc. in the coming years.
